He has assumed political, as well as military authority, and is collecting revenues in the name of Musa Khan, whom he pretends to regard as the rightful and reigning Ameer, though temportrily kept out of his capital by its foreible occupation by the Eritish. The Last Scene of a Strange Career-Ten Thousand People View the Remains-At the Morgae,

was the object of far greater interest to the people of this city than at any time during his strange career. His uneral took place yesterday afternoon from the undertaking essestions internoon from to undertaining establishment No. 16 O'Farrell street. All the forenoon the remains laid in state in the rearroom of the Morsue. Thousands flocked thither for a last look at the man whose peculiarities of mind, garb and person had rendered him familiar to all. The man of imaginary majesty, Emperor of the United States, Protector of Mexico and prespective consort of the Queen of Great Britain and Ireland and Empress of India, narrowly escaped burial in a plann redwood box. Many people, noting the odd manner of life of the old man, have unkindly surmised that his hallocination was simulated, and that he had adopted his strange life as a cover for a miserly heard of unaccountably-acquired wealth. When his effects were sourched it was found, as his best friends knew, that

with the little boys about him, stood at the head of the coffin and read the beautiful burial service of the Episcopal litturg. Then the children sang "Nearer, my God, to thee," prayer was offered, followed by the benediction. The doors were shut in the face of the crowd, which was still pressing forward, the lid of the coffin was put on and screwed down, and the body was placed in the hearse, which for more than a block drove through a lane between walls of people, which filled the side-walks and most of the street, the doorsteps, windows, and even the housetops. The deceased was a charter member of Occidental Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons, but since June 15, 1858, had stood suspended for non-payment of dues. The order has not been supporting him since, but many of its members have contributed to his support on individual account. On his person was found five or six dollars in small change, which was all his store. He had no personal effects of any value, and but for the kindly remembrance of people of means who knew Norton and had business relations with him many years ago when he was a citizen of substance and standing, he would have had a pauper's funeral at the city's expense. That his remains had more decent interment is due to Joseph G. Eastland. Mr. Eastland is a pioneer resident of this city.
